## Lierre Keith on Alternative vs. Oppositional Culture

## **Alternative Culture:**

Also known as cultural appropriation, politics is who you are, a politics of emotion in which feeling states outweigh effective strategy or tactics, goal is to feel intense, authentic, unmediated emotions, attacks on conventions—all boundaries are fair game, shock value, change is seen in psychological and cultural terms

## **Oppositional Culture:**

Alternative conceived of as cultural reclamation, protection, cultural respect and political solidarity; politics is what you do, a politics of community that values responsibility, mutual aid, work ethic—dependent on self-regulation, goals to guide community, socialize the young, enforce the norms, participate in larger project of righting the world, attacks on power structures, change seen in economic and political terms.

Politics is who you are	Politics is what you do
Human relations are corrupted in the act of political resistance; only right consciousness can prevail	Human relations are corrupted by systems of power and oppression; justice must prevail even if it takes generations
Generalized withdrawal as strategy	Withdraw loyalty from systems of oppression and the oppressors but active engagement to stop injustice
Moral vigor of youth cut off from action:	Idealism tempered by experience
